MINISTRY OF PRAISE—A WORD FROM DEACON FILIPS

Greetings Fellow Prayer Warriors!

It is election season!

In November of 2023 out-of-state pro-abortion forces launched a constitutional "Right to Abortion" amendment that would create a fundamental right to abortions in Nebraska. It would remove any restrictions we currently have and prevent any new restrictions. Any minor girl could have an abortion without her parents' consent up to the point the abortionist thinks the baby can live without "extraordinary medical intervention" (NICU). They say that is about 23-24 weeks, but the abortionist gets to decide if the baby can be aborted. Our bishops looked at our culture and our politics and realized that if they just told people to vote against this amendment, it would probably pass anyway, and we would lose, so they launched their own constitutional amendment called the Protect Women and Children Act which will also be on the ballot this fall.

It gets confusing because this is also a constitutional amendment, and it would still allow abortions in the first trimester or 12 weeks, and later in the case of rape or incest or medical emergencies. But it would not create a right to abortion, and most importantly it would allow the legislature to pass other laws in the future to protect women and children when we have the votes to do so. The laws we already have including informed consent, parental notification, license and inspection requirements for abortion facilities would all stay in place. The pro-abortion amendment would not allow any of this.

This is not ideal because we are still allowing some abortions, but it won't be any worse than what we have now, and it prevents doubling the cut-off from 12 to 24 weeks and allows further restrictions in the future. All 3 Nebraska bishops ask you to vote for our amendment as a good defensive move. If you are pro-life, you are now a minority, but we can put in solid protection for many babies and allow future gains.

The danger is that both amendments say they will allow abortions, and pro-life people will instinctively want to vote no on both. **Please** do <u>not</u> just vote no on both initiatives because the pro-abortion amendment will probably pass anyway; but if we can pass ours with more votes than theirs, our amendment will go into place and not theirs, even if it also passes. In the case of competing amendments, the bigger majority rules. I know that talking about power politics can make your head hurt but please follow Archbishop Lucas on this and vote for the Protect Women and Children Act and against the Right to Abortion act. Read them carefully and you can tell which is the bad one. The bad amendment is the one that calls abortion a fundamental right. Remember do not vote no on both or we will lose. Vote yes on the better amendment.

Think of this as what firefighters do when a grass fire or forest fire is too big to put out. They light a backfire to consume the fuel in front of the fire, so the fire burns itself out. They fight fire with fire, and it works. It will work here too. Because of the importance of explaining this critical vote, I used up all my space so there will be no catechism selection this month. My heart leaps for joy, and with my song I praise him." ~ Psalm 28:7


ARCHDIOCESAN ANNUAL MARRIAGE CELEBRATION

Jack turned around in time to see Bob's car pull away and head down the road. Jack watched until it disappeared. A full 15 minutes later, he too, pulled away and drove slowly home, praying for forgiveness and hugging a surprised wife and kids when he arrived.

MORE FACTS MOST CATHOLICS DON'T KNOW (BUT SHOULD)

- 1. In Vitro Fertilization Is Morally Unacceptable Many Catholics suffering from infertility utilize this process in the hopes of conceiving children, while remaining unaware that the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) declares it "morally unacceptable" (CCC 2377). In the Vatican Instruction, Donum Vitae, the Church states "...in conformity with the traditional doctrine relating to the goods of marriage and the dignity of the person, the Church remains opposed from the moral point of view to homologous 'in vitro' fertilization. Such fertilization is in itself illicit and in opposition to the dignity of procreation and of the conjugal union, even when everything is done to avoid the death of the human embryo."
- 2. There Is No Salvation Outside Of The Catholic Church Originally stated by St. Cyprian, the Latin axiom "Extra Ecclesiam nulla salus" reminds us that there is no salvation outside of the Catholic Church. This dogma was declared at the Fourth Lateran Council and is a source of confusion for Catholics and non-Catholics alike. According to the Catechism, all salvation comes from Christ the Head through the Church which is His Body. It does not mean that non-Catholics cannot achieve salvation. Individuals who are unaware that the Catholic Church is the one, true Church may still achieve salvation through the merits of the Church, despite their lack of knowledge.
- **3.** In An Emergency, Anyone Can Baptize Although the ordinary ministers of Baptism are bishops, priests and deacons, anyone can baptize in an emergency, even a non-baptized person. This extraordinary decision can be attributed to the necessity of Baptism for salvation and the Church's desire to make it readily available to all.
- **4. Hell And Purgatory Still Exist** Contrary to the belief of many Catholics, the Church still teaches that "the souls of those who die in a state of mortal sin, descend into hell, where they suffer the punishments of hell, eternal fire" (CCC 1035) Furthermore, "all who die in God's grace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation, but after death they undergo purification, so to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." (CCC 1030) This purification process, formally declared by the Church at the Councils of Florence and Trent, is known as Purgatory.
- 5. Catholics Don't Worship Mary And The Saints Many Catholics are confused about the role of the Blessed Mother and the Saints. Should we pray to Mary and the Saints or should we go "right to the top" and pray to God? In a nutshell, the Catholic Faith teaches that we must worship God alone. Mary and the Saints are to be honored, not worshipped. However, their intercession can be extremely powerful and emulating their virtues can put us on the road to Heaven.

RESPECT LIFE MONTH STATEMENT

October 2024

We are living in an exciting time of revival. Our National Eucharistic Congress, and the Eucharistic processions that led to it, involved hundreds of thousands of Catholics who will never be the same. The revival continues, and is so needed, especially in our efforts to defend human life.

Jesus, truly present in the Eucharist, gives us the fullness of life. He calls each of us to respect that gift of life in every human person. While we live in a society that often rejects those who are weak, fragile, or vulnerable, they are the most in need of our care and protection. Pope Francis reminds us that "every child who, rather than being born, is condemned unjustly to being aborted, bears the face of Jesus Christ, bears the face of the Lord, who even before he was born, and then just after birth, experienced the world's rejection." ¹

The law and millions of our brothers and sisters have yet to recognize this reality. We thankfully no longer live under the regime of Roe v. Wade, and our elected officials are now empowered to reduce or end abortion. But what we now see is that fifty years of virtually unlimited abortion has tragically created a national mindset where many Americans have become comfortable with some amount of abortion. This allows the abortion industry to continue to provide any amount of abortion. Given this challenge, the U.S. bishops have affirmed that, while it is important to address all the ways in which human life is threatened, "abortion remains our pre-eminent priority as it directly attacks our most vulnerable brothers and sisters, destroying more than a million lives each year in our country alone."2

"We are facing an enormous and dramatic clash between good and evil, death and life..."

In a tragic way, abortion has become the preeminent priority for others as well. We see many politicians celebrating the destruction of preborn children, and protecting access to abortion, even up until the moment of birth. Few leaders are standing up to limit the harm of chemical abortion (abortion pills) to mothers and children, which is now the most common form of abortion. And heading into the November elections, as many as ten states face gravely evil ballot initiatives that would enshrine abortion in their state constitutions.

Pope St. John Paul II's words resonate today: "we are facing an enormous and dramatic clash between good and evil, death and life, the 'culture of death' and the 'culture of life' ... we are all involved and we all share in it, with the inescapable responsibility of choosing to be unconditionally pro-life."³

And so we need a revival of prayer and action:

 We must renew our commitment to work for the legal protection of every human life, from conception to natural death, and to vote for candidates who will defend the life and dignity of the human person.

- We must call for policies that assist women and their children in need, while also continuing to help mothers in our own communities through local pregnancy help centers and our nationwide, parish-based initiative, Walking with Moms in Need.
- We must likewise continue to extend the hand of compassion to all who are suffering from participation in abortion, through the Church's abortion healing ministries like Project Rachel Ministry.
- Most importantly, we must rededicate ourselves to fervent prayer on behalf of life.

I invite all Catholics to join me in a concerted effort of prayer between now and our national elections, by daily praying our Respect Life Month "Prayer for Life to Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament":

Fesus, you came that we might have lifeand have it in abundance. Together with the Father and the Holy Spirit, you form us in our mothers' wombs and call us to love you for all eternity. As your most precious gift of human life is attacked, draw us ever closer to your Real Presence in the Eucharist. Dispel the darkness of the culture of death, for you are the light that shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it. By the power of your Eucharistic Presence, help us to defend the life of every human person at every stage. Transform our hearts to protect and cherish all whose lives are most vulnerable. For you are God, forever and ever. Amen.



Through the graces of this revival, may we witness, work, and vote so that all children in the womb will be protected in law and welcomed in love, and that all mothers and families will be strengthened by our support and accompaniment.








CONVERSATION STARTER GUIDE

Bringing Up the Pro-Abortion Ballot Initiative



6-STEP METHOD CONVERSATION EXAMPLE

Starter, Current Law, Deceiving, Dangerous, Demeaning, Action

Step 1: Conversation Starter

"I was at an event recently and they were telling us about this new abortion constitutional amendment they're trying to pass in Nebraska. Have you heard about this?"

Step 3: Explain Amendment (Deceiving)

"A group is trying to pass an amendment that will legalize abortion late into pregnancy, even after a baby feels pain. They're saying it's until "viability" but it's written as "viability without medical intervention" like the NICU. So in other words, abortion would be legal into the second and even third trimester."

Step 5: Explain Motive (Demeaning)

"The abortion clinics are trying to get this passed because they can make more money with no-regulations, but this will be really bad for women and girls if it does pass."

Step 2: Explain Current Laws

"In our current Nebraska laws, abortion is legal in the first trimester, with exceptions for rape, incest and life of the mother later into pregnancy."

Step 4: Explain Why It's Bad (Dangerous)

"Most abortions are in the first trimester, so all this amendment is really going to do is wipe out all the commonsense health and safety regulations on abortion clinics, like licensing, inspections and informed consent."

Step 6: Call to Action

"If someone asks you to support the abortion constitutional amendment, I wouldn't. If you see it on the ballot, make sure you vote "against" it. And if you can, tell other people about it because I don't think enough people are talking about dangerous proposal."

ST. PATRICK AUCTION—NOVEMBER 3RD








WORLD MISSION SUNDAY—OCTOBER 20, 2024
